Councilwoman's Corner

Did you know?



Through planning and zoning, towns have the authority to plan for and regulate the development of and use of real property for the community's health, safety and welfare. The basic premise of planning and zoning balances the well-being of the community against individual property interests by adopting local laws that are in line with the needs of the area and the town's vision for development. Article 16 of Town Law is the primary source for planning and zoning authority and allows towns to "regulate and restrict the size of buildings and other structures, ... and the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and other purposes". The central tenet of zoning is its concern with land use and not who uses or occupies the land.

Did you know that the Town of Somerset has the full list of Codes and Zoning on its website? Need to know the requirements for putting in a swimming pool or an outside wood burner? Check the website. Click on the Ordinances tab on the home page. There is a search function that allows you to locate a specific topic.

Cornell Cooperative Extension

Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) continues to play an important role in the well-being of Niagara County residents. As the Legislative representative to CCE and Chair of the Agricultural Farmland and Protection Board, I thought I would update you as to some of their activities throughout the year. The Executive Director, Justin P. Rogers, compiled a summary of some of the larger initiatives undertaken so far to date:

"The Veggie Van provided over 10,000 lbs. of fresh produce to low access communities during COVID."

"\$223,800 worth of healthy foods were distributed to Niagara County residents via food box giveaways."

"\$83,836 was raised for Niagara County 4-H youth via CCE's 1st ever virtual livestock auction in August 2020."

"\$29,961 worth of personal protection equipment & supplies were distributed to agri-businesses in Niagara County."

"224 volunteers provided 1,850 hours of service to fellow residents in 2019."

"10,500 Niagara County residents participate in CCE food safety and nutrition programs."

My hat is off to the hardworking men and women at our CCE. As many of you know, the Niagara County Legislature has designated them as a partner agency and as such received over \$ 384,000 in funding for 2020.

<u>Cemeteries</u> - Information on our cemeteries can be found on the Town website <u>www.somersetny.org</u> under the cemetery link. You may also call my office with any questions you may have.

<u>Before you Dig -</u> Remember to call 811 before you do any digging. It is the law that you must call at least two (2) full business days in advance so the underground utilities have a chance to mark out their lines.

<u>Backflow Preventers -</u> These are *required* on all new homes and homes that are being sold. It is your responsibility to install a preventer. Your water/sewer account will not be transferred without this requirement being met.

<u>Electronic Recycling -</u> This is an ongoing program and items can be dropped off at the Sewer Plant, 8500 Lower Lake Rd, on garbage days from 7am - 3pm.

<u>Park Pavilions</u> - If you are a Somerset resident and you would like to use the pavilions in the Somerset Park, you can make a reservation by calling the Town Hall at 795-3575 ext. 2 for the Clerk's office. There is no charge for using them if you are a resident.



REFUSE/RECYCLING PROGRAM



By now everyone should be aware of the new contract that we have with Modern Disposal for our garbage pickup. Effective January 1, 2021, all of your bags shall be placed in the totes that were provided by the Town of Somerset (exception for those who already have the same style tote and wished to keep using that instead). Modern will no longer stop and pick up bags and place them in the truck unless you have stopped in the Town Hall to purchase a tag to place on the bags for \$5.00 each. If you find that one tote is not enough to cover your refuse disposal needs you may purchase additional carts for \$46.33. Keep in mind that per this contract, you will see an additional charge on your tax bill of \$48.00 per tote for each of the additional totes that you place at the curb. This charge is for the pickup and disposal of your refuse. Another change will be to large item pickup. Instead of one large item every week, we will be allowed 3 large items during one specific week each month. Modern Disposal will be sending a flyer to all residents advising the new schedule. recycling program has not changed and will continue on an every-other week schedule. We ask for your patience as they implement the change to one person trucks.

ReSTART, ReTHINK and ReCONFIGURE NIAGARA COUNTY

In mid-spring, I announced the formation of 3 working groups charged with preparing Niagara County for post -pandemic operations. This effort involves members of the Legislature, as well as other county leaders, department heads and community partners. Niagara County and our residents are more than ready to get back to business, get back to fully functioning, but we fully recognize there is a little more to it than what we are used to. So, this is where I came up with the ReStart, ReThink and ReConfigure Niagara County initiative.

ReStart Niagara is focused on helping businesses get started back up and running, assessing government programs and providing any other support deemed necessary by the business community. This group works in partnership with Niagara USA Chamber and the Niagara County Center for Economic Development (NCCED). Most efforts were initially designed to help the business community meander through the numerous emergency orders put forth by Governor Cuomo. Our NCCED set up a web page which provided (and continues to provide) re-opening guidance for businesses during this un-precedented COVID event. The site is http://www.niagaracountybusiness.com. If you have a specific question, you can call the Center directly at 278-8750. Our Emergency Management Services office continues to supply the local businesses with necessary personal protective equipment. Our Department of Public Health has been doing an outstanding job in educating Niagara County residents in the wake of COVID. As a seated member on the Niagara County Board of Health, I can give you direct knowledge of the painstaking process we go through to weigh, measure and balance the "how to" as it relates to the almost daily ever-changing regulations imposed by the Governor, educating the public on said regulations, and keeping our people safe and as healthy as possible all while trying not to decimate the economy. ReThink Niagara is focused on what we have learned in providing services to our community during COVID that can modernize our service delivery moving forward. **ReConfigure Niagara** looks to operate Niagara County government in a time of severe budget constraints. These 2 groups work hand-in-hand with each other. Again, we are working closely with our department heads and our other elected officials, such as County Clerk Joe Jastrzemski and our Treasurer Kyle Andrews. Working through these 2 committees, we put in action a volunteer lay-off program to our county workforce. By having employees take the lay-off, the county was able to save over \$500,000 for the taxpayers. Just recently, the Legislature passed an early retirement incentive to the workforce at our October 2020 meeting. The numbers have not been collected yet, but the intent of the offer is that there must be a net savings to the taxpayer for the incentive to be provided.

These focus groups are not intended to be an academic exercise or some long range planning effort that will be implemented down the road. Niagara County residents will receive concrete action from each committee in real time.

WEST SOMERSET ROAD UPDATE

The County Highway Dept. has been moving equipment and material out to West Somerset Road throughout the summer season. Milling and paving the previously completed shoulder reconstruction is underway at the time of this writing. The next phase of piping and shoulder reconstruction will be on-going through the winter.

The County is winding down another highly productive year placing over 30,000 tons of asphalt on our roads. Some of the major roads were Ransomville, Riddle, Block Church, Tonawanda Creek and East Canal. Other shoulder rehab consisted of Hartland, Quaker, Youngstown/Wilson, Slayton Settlement, Royalton Center, Old Niagara and Wolcottsville Roads.

Our guide rail replacement strategy continues. The County conducted signage improvements on some of our roads. This should make the roads a little safer. There were 3 rounds of road-side mowing. One round of county-wide road patching was performed and the crew will be revisiting these sites in preparation for winter.



LACK OF BROADBAND LEAVES WNY RESIDENTS BEHIND IN COVID WORLD

The COVID-19 pandemic has forever changed our world and how we do things. From work to school, so many things that were once done in-person are now done remotely. This has made access to high-speed, affordable broadband internet essential for every New Yorker – from students learning from home to employees working remotely. But this pandemic has shown how far we must go to make that a reality.

Western New York has struggled with internet connectivity and dead zones for years. In 2015, Gov. Cuomo announced a \$500 million Broadband-for-All initiative to address this issue. It wasn't enough, and our communities bore the brunt of that insufficiency during the height of the pandemic.

Over 700,000 students and 18,000 teachers in our state lacked broadband access during the height of the pandemic. That's 27 percent of students and nine percent of our educators. This is a travesty, and it's absolutely unacceptable. It's time to make a real investment in our broadband and internet infrastructure to improve education, economic, and quality of life outcomes for Western New Yorkers.

Senate Democrats have made this investment difficult. In the 2019-2020 state budget, Democrats passed a broadband tax. It charges internet service providers tens of thousands of dollars to install new internet lines, a move that makes it nearly impossible to put broadband services in rural communities. Last month, I joined Orleans County Legislature Chairwoman Lynne Johnson and Niagara County Legislator Dave Godfrey to highlight the broadband tax's ramifications on residents of Niagara and Orleans Counties. Right now, this punitive tax is the biggest obstacle we face toward bringing the reliable, affordable internet we all deserve and, quite frankly, need.

My Senate Republican Conference colleagues and I believe that investing in rural and highneed communities and ensuring internet access is essential and of imminent importance. That's why we are pushing for a complete repeal of the broadband tax. That way, service providers can get to work installing new lines immediately, and we can make sure our students, teachers, and people working from home aren't left in the lurch any longer.

It's the 21st century. By eliminating the broadband tax and providing affordable access, we can make sure all New Yorkers are part of it.

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From Town of Somerset Justice Court.

As you are all plenty aware, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic for most of this past year, the Courts have had to cease operations for some time. As of now we are able to proceed in some fashion to help dispose of cases still pending, and incoming.

If you receive, or have received, a Vehicle & Traffic ticket please disregard the date that the officer enters on that ticket as you will receive a letter from the Court with your options. Please follow the directions in this letter from the Court so that your case can be moved along and disposed of in a timely manner.

If you have a Criminal Case pending, you will be notified by the Court if, and when, you should appear as these cases need to be spaced in a way to minimize the amount of traffic in the Court at any one time.

As for Summary Proceedings (eviction and non-payment concerns) these may resume and the Court is now able to accept these filings. Note though that there are still limits as to how the Court can settle these types of cases and that mediation services are strongly encouraged, when both parties do not have representation by an attorney.

Small claim matters can also now be filed with the Court and the matter will be scheduled, with notice being sent to both parties of when to appear.

Governor Cuomo has developed a list of States that, if you have been to any of them within 14 days of your scheduled Court Date, you may not visit the Court and should contact the Court with this information.

If you have any question please contact the Court at 716-795-3575 option 1 and the Court Clerk will return your call.

Thank you very much and the Court staff wishes you all good physical and mental health as we continue to 'get through this together'.

Eligible low-income households can receive discounted 30 Mbps high-speed internet, along with Security Suite and an internet modem, at no additional charge. Spectrum Internet Assist requires no contracts, and there are no data caps or hidden fees.

To qualify for this program, one or more members of your household must currently receive assistance under one of the following programs:

- National School Lunch Program (NSLP)
- Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) of the NSLP
- Supplemental Security Income (For Applicants 65+ Years of Age)
