Before you Dig - Remember to call 811before you do any digging. It is the law that you must call at least 2 full business days in advance so that the underground utilities have a chance to mark out their lines.

<u>Park Pavilions</u> - If you are a Somerset resident and would like to use the pavilions in the Somerset Park this season, you can make a reservation by calling the Town Hall at 716-795-3575 ext. 2 for the Clerk's Office. There is no charge for using them.

Electronic Recycling - This is an ongoing program and items can be dropped off at the Sewer Plant, 8500 Lower Lake Rd, on garbage days from 7am to 3pm.

<u>Backflow Preventers</u> - These are *required* on all new homes, and homes that are being sold. It is your responsibility to install a preventer. Your water/sewer account will not be transferred without this requirement being met.

<u>Tire Drop-off</u> - This year the drop-off will take place September 11-15 from 7am - 3:30pm, and September 16 from 9am - noon at the Highway Garage.

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

Fifty years ago this month, the Town of Somerset celebrated its 150th birthday with the Somerset Sesquicentennial Celebration July 1-7, 1973. The entire town went back in time to the year 1823 with men growing beards, women wearing hoop skirts, and everyone both old and young donning period costume for special events throughout the week. Women and girls became Centennial Belles, while the men and boys became Brothers of the Brush.

The main feature of this celebration was the 5-day outdoor production, "Somerset Story", a 90-minute spectacular show with over 250 local residents in the cast from 4 to 60 years of age along with actual horses. "Somerset Story" used a series of narrators to tell the highlights from our 150-year history of the Town of Somerset while the large cast acted out scenes from the Native Americans living at Golden Hill to then present day 1973. A 200-foot stage was built south of the school for the grand production with bleachers set up for the audience. It was reported that a total of 5,600 people attended the 5-day production.

The Sesquicentennial Queen was crowned based on the contestant selling the most tickets to the "Somerset Story". Each evening the Queen and her court would arrive by horse and carriage to the "Somerset Story". The Queen's Ball was so popular that the attendees had to be split into two locations for an evening of music and dancing from 9 pm to 2 am! Many musical groups performed throughout the week as well, such as Niagara County Barbershop Chorus, BCS Band, Square Dancing, and Buffalo Banjo Band.

The old Barker Firehall was turned into a saloon and another village building was set-up as Sesquicentennial Headquarters, where residents could purchase period costumes and memorabilia. The Barker Village Park housed stocks and a dunking tub for townspeople that were arrested during the festivities for violations of Sesquicentennial Rules. Some of the violations included not growing facial hair such as beards, not wearing regulation dress, or being caught wearing make-up without your Centennial Belle button in possession.

A 2-hour Sesquicentennial parade took place on Saturday and included marching bands, horse and carriages, antique automobiles, old and new agricultural equipment, firefighting units, along with many floats organized by businesses, organizations, and area groups. It was reported that 10,000 people from all over WNY lined the streets to view the Somerset parade. A midway of rides and games was open most days from 1-11 pm. Contests for adults and children also took place all week from tug of war, horseshoes, junior Olympics, a pet show, carriage driving, motorized drill competition, to best beards. Residents of historical homes opened their doors for tours during the celebration days as well.

Now, 50 years later, the Town of Somerset is ready to celebrate its 200th Birthday with our Bicentennial Celebration set for this month - July 21, 22, and 23. We hope you all will come out and enjoy the activities scheduled over our 3-day celebration! Also, stop by the Somerset Town Hall to view the Somerset Sesquicentennial display with some articles and artifacts from 1973.

Did you know?

Through planning and zoning, towns have the authority to plan for and regulate the development of and use of real property for the community's health, safety and welfare. The basic premise of planning and zoning balances the well-being of the community against individual property interests by adopting local laws that are in line with the needs of the area and the town's vision for development. Article 16 of Town Law is the primary source for planning and zoning authority and allows towns to "regulate and restrict the size of buildings and other structures, ... and the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and other purposes". The central tenet of zoning is its concern with land use and not who uses or occupies the land.

Did you know that the Town of Somerset has the full list of Codes and Zoning on its website? Need to know the requirements for putting in a swimming pool or putting in an outside wood burner? Check the website. Do you have a question on how many unlicensed vehicles you can have on your property? Check the website. Do you need a variance or Special use permit for a project? Check the website.

Have a safe summer and remember:
