NOTES ON REFUSE/RECYCLING

- * **MISSED COLLECTIONS**: Rule of thumb is to leave it out for the next day. Call customer service to let them know at <u>716-754-8226</u>.
- * If there is a problem of any kind, Modern will pick up your items but leave a note to let you know what the problem was so that it is not repeated.
- * Extra cardboard is allowed outside of the cart for recycling, but it must be flattened and bound so that it can be picked up and put into the cart to be emptied. They empty the cart then manually put the extra cardboard into the cart to be picked up and emptied.
- * Items for recycling should be in their original form. Example, milk jugs should not be crushed. They also should be placed loose in the cart, not in bags. The only exception is shredded paper, which should be in a clear bag. There is not enough time to open bags to see what is inside of them so they would just be thrown away, unfortunately.
- * Recycling items do not have to be clean but they should be empty.
- * Recycle bins are for household waste only. Do not put anything else in there, like clothing, hoses, animal carcasses, etc.
- * Currently milk jugs and aluminum are giving the best rate for rebates to the Town.
- * Schedules change so always plan to have your refuse/recycling to the street by 6AM.

The Redi-Grant for the water and sewer plant is moving along. Our Town Engineer is mapping everything out from lagoon rehab and cleaning to adding a third lagoon and electric work.

We are working with the County on our Hazard Mitigation Plan that all of the towns and villages have to update every 5 years per FEMA.

With the addition to our town park that was donated by the Neal and Fay Gordon family, our water and sewer crew have added some more trails with more to come next summer.

We are meeting with the power plant Vice President to discuss the Babcock House and property. I will keep you posted on this.

By now, those that qualify for an exemption, should have received the renewal applications for the following:

Agriculture, Aged, Disability and Exempt Properties

If you are applying for a new Aged or Enhanced Star Exemption, please be aware that we need the 2020 financials, not 2021. We also need 2020 for your renewal.

All renewals are due in the Assessor's office by March 1, 2022. Due to recurring COVID restrictions, we are asking that they be returned by mail whenever possible. If you need to speak with the Assessor, please call to make an appointment. This will alleviate any congestion in the hallway.

Fire Safety - Smoke alarms save lives

Smoke detectors are considered to be your number one warning device. Thousands of people still die each year in home fires where smoke alarms are not present. Having a smoke alarm cuts your chance of dying nearly in half if you have a home fire.

You need at least one working smoke alarm on every level of your home. Put them inside or near sleeping areas. Test smoke alarms once a month. Use a broom handle to gently push the "test button".

Put new batteries in alarms twice a year or when they 'chirp". An easy way to remember that it is time to change batteries is 'change your clocks ... change your batteries'. When you 'spring forward' or 'fall back', it has been about 6 months and time to change your batteries. If your alarms are ten years old or older, get new ones.

Also important – Will your smoke alarms wake you up if you are sleeping? Have a family member test the alarm while you are napping so you will know if you will wake up. If you are deaf or hard of hearing, get special smoke alarms that signal with strobe lights or vibrations.

By practicing fire safety procedures, you will be assuring yourself and your family of a fire safe environment.

A couple of reminders from our department: With the winter weather upon us, it is important to remember to keep your fire hydrants and vent pipes clear of snow.

With many homes selling within our town, it is good to remind our neighbors that only proper materials are to be flushed and washed down the drains into the sewer. To save on the cost of repairs and to ensure the proper function of your sewer utility, items such as diapers, rags (wipes) toys (plastic materials), and excessive grease are examples of materials that should not be disposed of in the sewer system.



PRIORITIZE PUBLIC SAFETY

Public safety is the one issue that should unite all elected officials regardless of political party - especially as our communities, our state, and our entire nation experience some of the worst violent crime spikes in decades.

From Town of Somerset Justice Court

We hope that you and your families continue to be able to adapt to our new way of life with minimal distress. As the weather begins to cool, we hope that you are looking forward to the holidays and spending time with family to make memories to warm you through the cold winter ahead.

As of this writing, Court is conducting in-person Criminal Court on the fourth Thursday of the month at 6pm.

If you have an attorney, continue talks with their office, who will then work with the Court to resolve the matter on your behalf.

Vehicle & Traffic matters will continue to be addressed through the mail. If you have received a Vehicle & Traffic ticket, or other appearance ticket, continue to disregard the date the officer may have indicated on that ticket for you to appear in Court in person. You will be notified, by mail from the Court, of any options you may have to resolve your matter.

As for landlord/tenant concerns, these inquiries should be directed to the Court by phone or mail. These matters can be reviewed to determine options for handling these cases, based on any protocol updates at the time of the inquiry.

The Court staff cannot give legal advice and cannot hear information on a pending or impending case prior to it being called. Please refer all of your legal questions to your attorney or you can visit <u>www.NYCourts.gov</u> to obtain information on filing a landlord/tenant case, a small claim case and other information.

Thank you for all of your continued patience with our office, other Town Departments and each other as we all try to "get through this" the best we can. Patience and compassion will make us stronger, together.
