A Word From Your Supervisor

Greetings to friends and neighbors in Somerset! The Town Board has been working very hard in the new term on a number of critical budget issues, quality of life/service enhancements and economic development strategies. Where do I begin? It's important that you are fully apprised on the status of the AES facility. The implications are obvious and enormous. The production of electricity there has been a source of confidence for our community and it's disconcerting to see the facility in its current state.

Let me begin by summarizing where we are at this point. As you are surely aware, their energy market has collapsed, federal and state environmental policy makers have imposed stringent regulations on coal plants which are intended to necessarily shut them down, frankly. The industrial demand for power is just not there largely as a result of a subpar business climate in this state and lastly, there is a tremendous need to upgrade the transmission system so WNY power plants can sell their power where it's needed. Budget decisions in Albany have neglected this critical energy infrastructure for far too long. The situation is tenuous right now as the facility is essentially shut down and remains in bankruptcy protection. There will undoubtedly be more setbacks as the facility strives to survive this period however, I want to convey in my letter to you a real sense of hope and optimism as we enter this most challenging time for our County, Town and School District. Let me share some reasons for which we can remain optimistic and hopeful.

First, the facility has undergone significant emission control improvements and is fully compliant with all current regulations including the most recent EPA version issued recently. While these regulations will certainly impact numerous plants throughout the country, Somerset is positioned well in this critical area. Second, the facility has an exceptional workforce and numerous evaluations by the bondholders have concluded that they are extremely proficient, productive and efficient in the manner by which they have operated the facility. Third, the bondholders, who are highly sophisticated financiers, have signaled a huge financial commitment to continue to operate the facility. They have begun organizing a "New Company" as part of a plan to bring the facility out of the bankruptcy court. Note that no other bidders came forward to purchase the plant clearly affirming a depressed market value at this time. Fourth, the basis upon which these major investors made their decision is their analysis of the energy markets. They signal confidence that the market will turn around in 2-3 years and will provide for an opportunity to attract an energy buyer to purchase the facility as the market value and investment prospects improve. They have noted that coal prices have dropped considerably (approaching 30%) even in the past year and the slowing of the natural gas drilling both are directly driven by market pressures in the plant's favor. To back up their projections, they are poised to inject millions of dollars in a facility that they believe absolutely can and should remain a viable coal facility. These are solid rationale for hope, I believe.

The bondholders have asked that the PILOT payments be reduced. The market value of the facility is clearly and significantly reduced at this time and the taxing jurisdictions are very mindful of this. They have also asked for significant concessions from their workforce. Each and every one of us are stakeholders at this point whether we like it or not. We now have, as I see it, one shot at success here. I do not anticipate the bondholders holding onto and investing in this facility after the current PILOT is up and they have said as much. It will either return to a marketable value and be sold or it will close. We all clearly have a great stake in this and I am encouraging us to approach this as a chapter in a great story of survival. The facility weathering this period, being sold and returning to profitability is the mission. The alternative is simply not an option.

If you are planning to have your driveway paved in the future, make sure your contractor has the finish grade of your driveway the same as or lower than the road. The wing plows on our trucks will damage the driveways if they are higher than the road. Also, if you intend to have a concrete driveway installed, it is necessary to end the concrete at the road right of way which in most cases is 33 feet from the centerline of the road.

Remember to crush your lightweight plastic containers before you recycle them. It keeps them from blowing out of the bins and trucks and prevents them from blocking drainage pipes and it keeps our Town looking good.

Town highway projects are in the planning stages at this time. The cost of highway construction materials are directly affected by the price of oil which in the present climate will significantly reduce the amount of work that can be completed with the dollars budgeted. As always your patience and cooperation during construction season is greatly appreciated.

A resident recently asked, "So, how is the Board preparing for such an unknown future?" While we are hopeful for a future that includes a viable facility, at the same time please know that we are squarely focused on the strengths of our community and are striving to attract more economic development opportunities to diversify the source of our tax revenue. We have tasked the Planning Board to revise our Comprehensive Plan focusing directly on our community assets to entice corporate site selectors and we have included the Village of Barker to be part of this effort. We are positioning the planning and zoning documents to be cohesive and thus eliminating roadblocks for economic development projects. I am engaged with our Town engineering and planning consultants as well as the Center for Economic Development. We are in the process now of promoting an aggressive marketing plan for certain development opportunities that coincide with the Regional Economic Development funding which has been committed to WNY. I hope to be able to report very soon on a project under consideration currently. Further, this Town Board has demonstrated a genuine commitment to face difficult budget issues head on and not just take the easy or the convenient route. We believe it's important that the spending levels be reduced, every budget line needs to be squeezed and we are intent to do this. We also have a certain level of reserves on hand (or fund balance) that were strategically collected for the very purpose to help offset unexpected events and help our taxpayer's transition gradually. The Board's view is that those reserves were already paid by the taxpayers and should be committed before considering tax increases. We also believe that future spending must be evaluated with less revenue projections and we are not going to just live off our savings, so to speak. We need to be ready to come out of this in either direction, with or without a viable coal facility. From the Town's perspective, I would characterize our approach as an "all hands on deck" type of effort. From each of our valued employees who deliver exceptional service in every manner to each and every Board and committee member, we are strategically planning and preparing for an uncertain future with the taxpayer at the forefront. Our community demands and depends upon it!

In closing, I sincerely encourage you to reach out to me or any Town Board member and express your thoughts, concerns, and ideas concerning the Town. It helps us to better represent you at Town Hall.

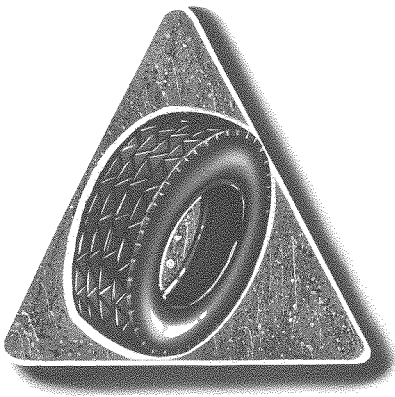

BEFORE YOU DIG - Please remember to call for underground utility location before you do any digging. The number is **811**.

DOUBLE CHECK BACKFLOW PREVENTION DEVICES - These devices are REQUIRED on all new construction and when there is a CHANGE of property owner. Final readings for property sold will include inspection for the double check valve. All irrigation meters also must have backflow prevention devices.

TOWN EMPLOYEE IDENTIFICATION - If anyone comes to your door saying he is from this department and needs access to your house regarding your water or sewer, he will be driving a marked Town of Somerset truck and will have Town employee identification. If this is not the case, do not let them in and call this Department immediately at 795-9919.

The Town's New - Police Constable Force:

I thought that this would be a great time to provide an accurate account and update regarding police services within the Town.

I am pleased to report that:

- Our Police Constables are fully empowered under the law as certified police officers and can perform commensurate law enforcement functions. (a copy of our approved law can be found on the Town's website)
- We are within our budget.
- Our Police Constables are now engaged in patrol functions.
- Our Police Constables are missioned to protect life and property in the Town.
- Our Police Constables are pleased to conduct professional house security checks while you are away. There is a form that you can fill out and is available on the Town's website or at the Town Supervisor or Clerk's office.

Police services have been strategically refocused to enhance their effectiveness by concentrating manpower during the times when the call volume is greatest. The Town residents have communicated that they don't believe full scale coverage is necessary but rather prefer a consistent presence. The Town Board has worked to deliver those expectations and will allocate your town budget's dollars accordingly. The feedback to the Board has been overwhelmingly in support of this scope of service delivery, but as with every budget line it will be closely evaluated throughout the year to determine if further adjustments are appropriate. The Public Safety Committee that was implemented by Supervisor Engert is in place to measure feedback and assess impact. The Town Board is committed to the implementation of a "Community Based" policing model for our Town. You can expect that the Police Constables will be visible, approachable and pro-active in getting to know those whom they serve.

The Board will be introducing the Police Constables in another communication, but please know that the services of four experienced (and highly decorated) officers with more than 100 years of police experience make up your force. They include two Town residents and two men from neighboring towns. In the near future there will be an informative communication that will provide you with a great deal more information about these fine officers. They are well trained and have received a comprehensive "Rules of Operation and Procedure" manual which was implemented by the Supervisor.

At this juncture I would be remiss if I didn't acknowledge that Supervisor Engert's law enforcement administration experience, RISK management expertise, and training have worked in concert with his high level of knowledge regarding the structure and various layers of legal and procedural issues and have served the Town and the Board extremely well. He has successfully guided the implementation of the Department and provides direct oversight of the operation for the Town Board.

I would like to close by acknowledging the input of the Public Safety Committee volunteers: Matt Pestinger, Herb Linderman, Dale Howard, & Tom Carestia. Along with Board members Jeff Dewart and me, the Committee is charged with being a conduit for ideas and information between the Town Board and the public. I sincerely thank each of them for their suggestions as I worked through the content of this article. There will be more information coming out when the introduction to the Police Constables communication is released. The officers can be reached during the evening hours DIRECT at 716-255-0503, or they will be dispatched by the Sheriff's Office at 438-3393 for non-emergencies. **If you have an emergency call 911.**

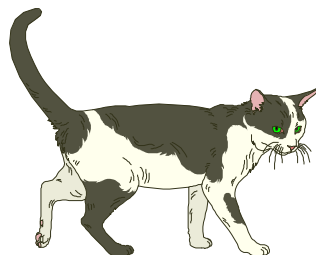

The NYS DEC and the Niagara County Dept of Health have very strict laws and guidelines pertaining to open burns. Basically, an open burn in Niagara County is illegal. A small controllable fire coupled with high winds, dry vegetation and exposure to nearby structures can become very large and uncontrollable in a matter of seconds. Composting or bagging up your yard debris for weekly pick-up is a safer way of disposal.

I would also like to inform our residents that April 21st and 22nd is the 2nd annual NYS Fireman's Assoc. Recruit New York program. This program encourages fire departments all across the state to open their doors to the public in the hopes of recruiting new members to the volunteer ranks. Therefore, the Barker Fire Dept will open their doors for an open house on Saturday April 21st from 1pm until 4pm. It's spring time and what comes with it are the home improvement projects we all thought about all winter. I would like to remind our residents that The Code of the Town of Somerset requires a Building Permit for all construction, erections, alterations, additions and remodeling. Permits are also required for all swimming pools that hold 24" or more of water. Swimming pools also require an electrical inspection and pool alarms.

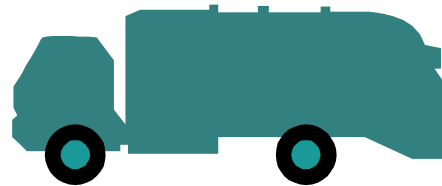
I will also be actively enforcing the NYS Property Maintenance Code and the Town of Somerset Weeds and Grass ordinance. Enforcing these laws is critical to the health and safety of your family, the prevention of fires and for the overall aesthetics of our town.

The office has also been receiving numerous calls as to whether or not permits are required for fences. At this time, fences do not require a permit; however, there are some restrictions to fences depending on where you live and what your property is zoned for. It's always wise to contact my office to find out if any of the fencing requirements pertain to your particular project.

**GARBAGE AND RECYCLING NEWS**

You may have noticed that the people who pick up your garbage have been placing your recycling in the same truck. Modern is changing their fleet to a single source truck. The truck has a divider inside that allows both trash and recycling to be placed into the same truck while being kept separate. The truck has a better compacting system and allows for more volume to be placed in the new truck as well. Although it appears that they are being mixed in the truck, the items are being kept separate so it's still important to continue to separate your recyclables!

Some items that you may not be aware that are acceptable for recycling: Cardboard (pizza boxes included) flattened and cut into pieces; kitchen cookware (metal pots, pans and utensils); empty household plastic containers (#3-#7) such as aspirin containers and cd cases.

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS for recycling: paper milk or juice cartons, Styrofoam containers/packing, propane tanks, paint cans, colored glass, medical waste/syringes, flammable liquids, household cleaners, chemicals (dry or liquid), wood items, concrete, garden hose, and electrical cords.

If your recycling bin is full, clear plastic bags can be used for additional items.

You may pick up forms and instructions from the Assessor's & Clerk's offices or obtain the forms from the state's website (www.orps.state.ny.us/). This is also a great source for understanding the assessment process.

Completed forms must be returned to the Town on or before May 22, 2012 for scheduling of appointments. No forms can be accepted after May 22nd.

The Assessor's staff will be available during normal business if assistance is required. If you feel that your assessment is fair but your taxes are too high, your comments should be addressed to the appropriate taxing jurisdiction. The assessor's office has no control over tax rates or budgets. The Assessor's job is to make sure every property owner is assessed at a Fair and Equitable Market Value.
