SUPPORT AMENDMENT OF THE REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW

WHEREAS, the current STAR real property tax savings may be less than the amount of the STAR real property tax savings from the prior year and has no floor values, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature is considering legislation amending Subparagraph (i) of Paragraph (a) of Subdivision 2 of Section 1306-a of the Real Property Tax Law, as amended by Section 1 of Part LL of Chapter 59 of the Laws of 2019 to add language in relation to providing that the amount of a STAR real property tax savings may not be less than the amount of the STAR real property tax savings from the previous year, which will create a floor for the STAR program, and

WHEREAS, the establishment of such legislation would create a floor that protects low income individuals and those on fixed incomes to ensure they receive, at a minimum, the same STAR real property tax savings in the following year, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Assessor's Association supports this Bill,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Board of the Town of Somerset that

the Real Property Tax Law be amended to provide that the amount of a STAR real property tax savings not be less than the amount of the STAR real property tax savings from the prior year and hereby supports the New York State Bill, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Town Clerk is hereby authorized to forward a copy of said resolution to the following persons:

WHEREAS, the Town of Somerset Multiuse Site (MUS) shoreline has experienced erosion and bank instability as a result of Lake Ontario's extreme high water levels; and

WHEREAS, the Somerset Power Plant is scheduled to be decommissioned in 2020; and

WHEREAS, the multiuse site was identified as a potential recreational and aesthetic resource for Town residents and visitors when the Somerset Power Plant began operation in 1984, for which an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) was completed; and

WHEREAS, the multiuse site was further identified as a potential recreational and aesthetic resource for Town residents and visitors when the Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan (LWRP) was adopted in 2005 and when the Comprehensive Plan was adopted in 2012; and

WHEREAS, the Town seeks to mitigate further erosion to the multiuse site shoreline by regrading it to a more gradual slope and reinforcing it with native vegetation; and

WHEREAS, the Town sees to further protect the shoreline with bio-engineered coir logs, coir matting, and root wads, all of which will provide structural support to the shoreline and will shield it from wave action; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Somerset desires to serve as the SEQR Lead Agency for the proposed shoreline protection project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Somerset Town Board, in accordance

with the New York State Quality Review Act (SEQRA), hereby authorizes the Town Engineer to complete an Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) Part 1 and initiate a Coordinated Review to establish the Town Board as Lead Agency for the proposed project and to prepare a mailing to identified involved and interested agencies in order to receive comment on the Lead Agency Designation and the proposed project.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

<u>Betty Wolanyk</u> discussed her research on solar and provided specifics on the Ridge View Solar project being proposed in Hartland. Solar panel issues include panel fires that can release toxic gases; potential battery storage fires and explosions; fire control response due to the project being fenced off and monitored from San Diego or by one employee who is supposed to be on duty; the need for a Haz-Mat team; subsurface drainage issues; replacing the batteries that cannot be recycled; and concern of the land falling under the auspices of the Department of Homeland Security with the possibility of it being claimed by the Department under Eminent Domain; the land could also be condemned and claimed by the corporation to have no value.

<u>Norm Jansen</u> stated that he used to work at a chemical plant that handled Hydrogen Sulfide and said that it is extremely deadly.

Jim Hoffman discussed an article where Governor Cuomo calls the goals in the current system of siting renewable energy "baloney" and criticizes Article 10 for taking too long for a project to begin. The Governor wants the State to acquire potential sites, permit the projects, and deliver shovel-ready sites to the developers. Jim then addressed the remaining Meteorological Tower permit that is up for renewal. He stated that it was supposed to be a temporary installation that has been up for 6 years now. He feels that the tower is a continued threat to wildlife, local aviation including aerial spraying in support of farming activity, and Mercy Flight operations. He went on to address a proposed communications tower at the Mayer Brothers site. He said that all towers have gone through the Planning Board for a Special Use Permit and this should be no exception. He likes that the design that will be used is a monopole which is much less dangerous to wildlife. He also stated that there is a parking and equipment storage issue regarding the new addition at Mayer Brothers as our zoning regulations do not allow outdoor storage in front or side yards. He hopes that what they are doing is temporary.

<u>Agnes LaPorte</u> talked about the destruction of her mailbox and thanked the Town of Somerset Highway Department and Police Department. She said that the Police Department located the suspect in about a week.

<u>Cathi Orr</u> just wanted to say that she wishes she could be a fly on the wall in a meeting of Governor Cuomo and President Trump.

<u>Norm Jansen</u> said that in his travels a few weeks ago it was snowing heavily and the roads were terrible until they got to the Town of Somerset.

Supervisor Dewart stated that beginning next month we will move our Town Board meetings back to the front meeting room.

On a motion of Councilwoman Jansen, seconded by Councilman Hotaling, the meeting adjourned at 6:32P.M. subject to the Call of the Clerk.
